1. Overview

Proficiency in English language is critical for successful academic studies and indeed central to student experience, therefore admission to NAPS requires minimum English language standards. However, the Academy recognises that some international students might need extra language support to manage their studies effectively. Accordingly, NAPS courses include access to NAPS' comprehensive English Support Program.

NAPS also has additional assistance to support students' professional and career development and academic skills beyond language requirements.

2. NAPS English Language Requirements

Although NAPS has management, academic and administration staff fluent in other languages, the principal language at NAPS and the language of instruction is English. All students are therefore required to demonstrate a minimum level of proficiency in the English language to qualify for admission.

The following criteria apply:

- Students from Australian local institutions must have completed a Higher School Certificate or equivalent from overseas.
- Mature students from English speaking countries must pass an English language proficiency interview conducted by the Dean or nominee.
- For students from non-English speaking countries who apply onshore or directly from their countries, the condition of admission is an IELTS (Academic) test with a minimum score of 6.00 with no sub-band score less than 5.5 or equivalent in TOFEL or other accredited English language test program.
- Students who do not meet the minimum English Language requirement may be permitted to enrol
 after successful completion of an appropriate English for Academic Purposes program accredited
 by NEAS and approved by the Academy.
- When an IELTS score or equivalent is used to demonstrate English proficiency, that score must have been attained within two years of the date of application for admission.

3. English Language Support Program

This program focuses on developing foundational skills and understanding of the rules and conventions that form the basis of academic work, particularly Business English, to assist students with their studies, life in Australia and in their careers.

Proficiency in English is also a requirement for CPA/Chartered Accountants Australia/ANZ membership. Therefore, the program also focuses on assisting non-English Speaking background (NESB) students to be better prepared for CPA and similar memberships.

The program is part of the Academy's mission to provide equivalent opportunities for success to all students irrespective of their linguistic background.



The program includes:

- individual consultations with the NAPS English Language Coach of up to three hours per week by appointment;
- Academic English and Study Skills workshops held throughout the trimester;
- Academic English Guide (available via the online Library); and
- access to additional free online resources to enhance business English and writing skills available on the NAPS Skills Hub.

Students who have queries or would like to book a consultation with the English Support Manager or Coach, are asked to do so through Student Services.

Online Academic Learning Support

In addition to language assistance, NAPS provides students with extensive online learning support. A list of subject-specific and general information guides containing the best databases and resources available are accessible via the Library website. Many useful support materials can also be located within the *Study Skills and Academic English Module* on Moodle.

Through Moodle, students will also be able to engage in chat room discussion, collaborate during group assignments and access additional materials from their lecturer such as lecture slides, tutorial notes and relevant unit and course materials.

Early Intervention for Students at Risk

Each students' performance within the teaching trimester is monitored so that NAPS can offer assistance if required to help a student to successfully complete their units. Students are encouraged to discuss their progress with their lecturer and/or tutor or with the Student Services Manager whenever they have any concerns. Language, attitude, organisation and study skills are considered as part of the action plan.

Indicators of students at risk of not completing the unit satisfactorily include:

- indication of poor verbal language skills during the one-on-one time which is a part of NAPS
 Orientation;
- an assessment during Orientation to see who will benefit from extra help;
- not attending lectures and/or tutorials,
- lack of engagement in the learning process; and/or
- achieve less than 50% in several assessment tasks.

Students identified as 'at risk' need to meet with a NAPS staff member to work together to design an appropriate remedial strategy including access to appropriate support services. See the NAPS Students at Risk Policy and Students at Risk Procedure for more information.

4. NAPS Skills Hub

Online courses to help students independently develop their language, academic and professional skills are provided through the NAPS Skills Hub.



The Skills Hub is the gateway to online tutorials, collaborative learning and other up-to-date, useful information to help students to develop additional technological and 'soft' skills. These online courses do not earn any credit points, but they are free and look impressive in students' resumes and e-Portfolios.

The Hub is organised into four categories:

- Business Degree Skills,
- Learning Skills,
- Technological Skills, and
- Resources for NAPS Teachers.

The Hub is regularly updated according to student demand.

The long-term goal is to have online courses on e-Leadership, a database of targeted business study resources, project management skills and career information.

Useful professional information will also be provided including trends in related professions, job opportunities; interview skills and resume preparation.

The Learning Skills section of the Hub will provide learning modules on areas such as Academic English proficiency, Academic Integrity, Writing Skills and time management.

The Technology Skills section of the Hub will provide tutorials on essential technology skills such as Word, PowerPoint, Adobe, Excel, Meeting and Collaboration tools and the optional development of an ePortfolio.

The NAPS Skills Hub is one of the features that facilitates a professional culture and community of scholarship and professional excellence at the Academy, to enrich the learning experience for both students and NAPS' staff. See the NAPS Skills Hub and Framework for more information.
